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

Talk the Walk #3 and #4

At several recent meetings, I have presented short "Talk the Walk" presentations and then put the information in our newsletter. This issue I am including April's and a preview of September's.

3 The American Volkssport Association (AVA)—National

(AVA) is the parent organization that our club is responsible to. They sanction walks, track walk accomplishments, provide news, connect walkers across the nation, and oversee all club and walker activities in the US. They provide insurance for walk locations and our umbrella 501(c)3 non-profit status.

Any of our walks can be done as fun or credit walkers without membership is a club or AVA; but it takes many members to cover organizational costs, keep clubs and walkers connected, and provide the record keeping that serves us all. Not the least of AVA member benefits are the national webpage, walk search links, and news found in the *American Wanderer*—AVA's premier print newspaper. This paper provides information on walks and special programs, and regional and 50-state Volkssporting news, and is worth the membership fee by itself. #4 Walking a Year-Round Event (YRE) or Seasonal Event (SE).

Unless a new member gets someone to walk with them, finding and doing a YRE or SE walk can be nerve-racking. First some definitions, then the *How-To*:

- A Volksmarch (walk) is a noncompetitive 5 km (3.1 mile) or 10 km (6.2 mile) walk.
- **Traditional Walking Events** are organized by clubs, sanctioned by AVA, and held on <u>one day</u>—they are <u>group walks</u>. The stamps are good for that day only.
- Year-Round Events (YREs) are events sanctioned for at least eleven continuous months in a calendar year. They have a continuous start time that allows the completion of the event during daylight hours.
- Seasonal Events (SEs) are events sanctioned for less than eleven continuous months during the year, with continuous start times, and done in daylight hours. These are usually found in colder climate states.

By using the AVA publication *Start-Point*, or by searching the event maps online, at http://clubs.ava.org/ava_search.asp you can find over 4,000 YRE/SE walks in the US. Here is the step-by-step to get your feet on a YRE/SE?

- Go to the webpage above.
- Click on the Select Area dropdown for the state you want.
- Find the city/area you are interested in by zooming into the Red Pins.
- · Click on the Pin.
- Pick a walk and click on the walk name (there will be one or more walks for each pin).
- You now have one-walk with a description of the walk and how to find the start-point.

#4 Walking a Year-Round Event (YRE) or Seasonal Event (SE)

The best way to drive to the physical start-point is to print this description and find it on a map or using a GPS. *Note:* there may be restricted times the start-point is open. All types of start-points exist: hotel front desks, quick shops, community visitor centers, resorts, grocery customer service counters, national park offices and more. So, it may be at a city visitor center or a store that is only open from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

Once at the physical start-point, politely ask for the "walk box." In places with high employee turnover you may have to show your walk books and say what you are looking for different ways: walk box, Volkswalking instructions/walk, walking folder, instruction to go on a walk, etc. Some start-points don't have actual boxes anymore, they use accordion-like document holders. Please respect customers at business start-points; they come before asking for a start box.

- Inside the box will be a log to print, sign and note the type of walk you will do; it is controlled numbered 1, 2, 3...28, 29, 30... and on. Many walkers carry personal mailing address stickers as a quick way to register on this log sheet. Your signature on this log is also your liability waiver for the walk. Log numbers go on your start card.
- In the box will also be a start card and payment envelope. These come in different forms. Start cards can be an old AVA form, unique by club on cardstock, printed on the envelope or other club designs. Watch for tabbed-folders in the box for start cards, envelopes and other materials. Many envelopes are mail-in; some clubs provide postage, others need a stamp. Some clubs have a folder or bank bag in the box and want the start card/payment/envelope left in the box.
- Boxes also contain maps and directions for the walk. These are for you to keep, though some clubs put their start card at the bottom to tear-off and return.
- Special Note: some clubs have more than one walk in the same location box. Be sure to get the walk folder, map and instructions, start card and directions for the walk you want.
- Carry the start card with you on the walk. This is both for identification if you are injured and need help, and to record any check-points the club asks for. Often, 5K walks do not have check-points, but always look for check-point requirements on each instruction sheet.
- Once you complete the walk, mail in the payment envelope with your check and start card, or drop them in the box, as required. Cash is allowed if the envelope is being left in the box; but don't mail cash.
- Stamp your books. Ask for the box back and use the stamp and ink pad provided. The stamp should be facing so the year will be on the left and sanction number on your right when you place it in the
- Always thank the business/location for hosting an AVA box.





Our Eclipse Committee has been working, working, working! Over 100 people have signed up for events on each of Saturday, Sunday and Monday.

With the large numbers, we have had to move our Meet and Greet on Friday evening to a different venue. We will be meeting (and having preregistration package pickup) at St. Mary's Cathedral, 112 S. Cedar Street in Grand Island.

We have taken advantage of it's central location to add a 5 and 10 km route in this historic downtown area.
