Sandy peaks

Butch and I have managed to finish half of our Appalachian Trail walks. We started in the spring by doing Baxter State Park in Maine. It was a great walk, but not easy to get to. Lots of rules in Baxter State Park and a very slow speed limit. It takes

at least two hours to traverse the 40 mile long road through the park. Luckily, we did not have to travel the entire road to get to the start of the walk. We did manage to see a bear and a minx, both from the comfort of our car. The walk itself had a choice of three loops two of which went



uphill to waterfalls. Little Niagara is little but still beautiful. The third loop was a little flatter around a lake.

After our wet walks in Small Town Nebraska, we took off for warmer and hopefully dryer climes starting at the south end of the AT. Unfortunately, we were right on the tail of Hurricane Michael. Meant some rainy weather driving. We spent the night in the little German town of Helen. Very cute town with great German food, a nice view of the river and friendly people. After a 1:00 a.m. phone call that was totally strange, we woke early to sunshine. We started our first walk in Hiawassee, Georgia. This trail was typical AT with hills, roots and rocks but beautiful views.

On to Tennessee for a very cool but clear morning where we started at the State Line for Tennessee



and North Carolina. You could walk either state just by crossing the street.
Again, very typical AT. You think you are starting at the top of the mountain, but the trail continues up.

Then it was off to Hot Springs, NC. We did the in

town part of the walk in the afternoon. Instead of white blazes, the in town portion was marked in the sidewalk. Our hotel was one of those cute historic hotels, which means no TV, no cell service, no internet and no heat in a room the size of a closet. After a few games of Yahtze, we cuddled down to stay warm till morning. Got up before the sun to walk the rest of the trail which

again was hilly, rocky and quite a challenge in the semi-dark cloudy morning.

On to Damascus, Virginia. The trail here was quite a surprise. Almost totally flat with most of it in town. Instead of white blazes, it was marked in the sidewalk.




Our last two walks both started in the same town-Harper's Ferry. Our hotel was a block from the West Virginia Trail so we were able to walk to the trail. First mistake we made was not reading the fine print. The computer printout from the AVA website listed the rating as a 2B. No need for walking sticks on a 2B trail, so I left mine in the hotel. Luckily my kind husband let me use his. The AT trail was actually rated 3D according to the walk description. (I thought it was a 4D as I

don't remember walking a single flat area other than crossing the bridge). It was our toughest trail with lots of rock, steep climbs, leaves covering the trail and lack of white blazes in areas so we had to



search at times to be sure we were still on the trail. It did finish in town, but the town is again very hilly and the streets and sidewalks are paved with cobblestone so not an easy finish.

Our final walk from Harper's Ferry crossed a railroad bridge into Maryland. The trail followed a canal and was totally flat. A great relaxing finish to our trip. Five minutes after finishing this last



trail, the rain started. And continued most of the way home. Can't complain. Able to do all of the walks in dry weather.

Trailmaster certification is a knowledgeable resource in the art of volkswalk trail making. To receive this recognition, the applicant starts by reading manuals outlining the how-to's and wherefores of creating an event: where to have the walk, what you want to see, mapping the route, marking the trail, publicity, walk maps and instructions, workers' walks, Traditional or YRE, budget, trail ratings, Start/Finish and checkpoints, and cleaning up the trail after the walk. And there's an exam at the end!! Whew! That's quite an accomplishment, you two!

Tecumseh was the location for the Sunday morning walk. The continuous heavy rainfall was disappointing, however this made the exploring of the museum and other points of interest


become the focus!




