
The Prez Sez (continued)

Sandy peaks

When AVA requested its board members to help run the

Crazy Horse walk, we felt compelled to volunteer. We traveled up a couple of days early to get in some nice walks. Spending time in the open air is still the safest way to enjoy time during the pandemic. We ate takeout, either going to a park to eat or returning to our hotel room. The hotel was

following precautions. Masks and social distancing were in place. There was no room cleaning. Just put your trash outside the door and it would disappear. We wiped down the touch surfaces such as TV control, door handles and light switches with sanitizing wipes. Breakfast consisted of a takeout bag with a bottle of water, energy bar, apple and muffin. I took my own bowl of oatmeal to heat up in the microwave.

We helped mark the trail on Thursday. This was our chance to see the changes to Crazy Horse since our last visit. I learned something new. Hidden in the woods, the family that owns the monument has their own little cemetery with

mausoleums all built of local stone. The changes to the monument are all in the arm. The area you walk on is all polished stone. You can see the knuckles of the hand and can tell where the pointing finger will be.

We have walked Crazy Horse a few times and have always been in awe during this great event. This year we experienced it from an entirely different perspective. South Dakota is very much a "Free Will" state. They are the only state in the union that refused any of the CARES Act money. There are no mask mandates. The Black Hills Volkssport Assn., AVA and the Crazy Horse Memorial owners debated if this event could be held safely during a pandemic. They did not want to get the reputation of being a superspreading event as was done with the Sturgis Rally. Walkers were handed flyers at the entrance to Crazy Horse telling them to have exact change. Eight foot tables were set up eight feet apart. The ground was marked with 6 foot distancing. A huge sign was set up at the entrance telling the walkers to mask during registration. A large bottle of hand sanitizer was set up at the entrance. Sanitizer was at every table. A system of clean pens and used pens was set up. Different areas were set up for filling out registration cards and paying. Walkers were to immediately walk onto the trail after paying.

The first day of the event dawned cool and clear. Butch and I handed out start cards with gloved hands and masked faces. The walkers lined up and looked at the mask sign and actually put on their masks. Many used the hand sanitizer (brrr!). We did have to remind many to have only one family group head to a table. But some of those family groups were really large!

Sunday brought a different group of people. Less likely to mask and more likely to "flock" to the tables. Volunteers worked hard to keep them distanced and most followed guidelines once they were reminded. I worked one of the registration tables. The walkers were directed to these tables to fill out their start card then directed to move on to the other tables where they would drop off their \$3 and head for the trail. It was an efficient system. It was a REALLY chilly morning. We had to use ice scrapers on the tables to scrape away the frost which continued to reaccumulate for the first hour. My most memorable registrants had a home town feel. As one wrote their town of College Springs, Iowa, I couldn't help but comment. This is a town of 400 where my Great, Great Grandfather lived. Shortly after that, there was a family from Modale, Iowa, where I grew up. This is a town of less than 300. It is a small world! One couple was thrilled when it started snowing. She was from the rain ravaged state of Florida and he was from burning California.

Overall, this was a well-run event and as safe as it could be made. Lots of planning and lots of volunteers made it happen. No known cases of Covid-19 have been attributed to the event. And walkers were delighted.


Walker of the Year Nominations

Changes to Club Dues


As noted earlier, we will not be having a F2F Annual dinner. See more in this newsletter about our ZOOMTM meeting in January. However, as a way of saying thanks to hanging in with us during the uniqueness of 2020, the club will have free membership renewals in 2021. This article clarifies on how the free 2021 dues will work:

- Anyone joining now through 12/31/20 still must pay for a full year.
- Any club member whose membership expires before 12/31/20 still must pay for a full year.
- Anyone who joins in 20**21** will join for free and their membership expires 12/31/**21** (a benefit that Lincoln members who join us will like).
- All club members current as of 1/1/21 have their memberships expire 12/31/21.
- All club members in 2021 who wish to be club members in 2022 will pay \$10 individual or \$15 family due by the annual banquet in January 2022.
- Anyone who joins later in 2022 will have their membership prorated [quarterly] so that it expires 12/31/22.
- (7) Since club members who adopt a YRE/SE/Traditional Event have no annual dues, per our by-laws, they will receive 5-coupons valued at \$3 apiece for use <u>only</u> at our club events.

Also and just FYI, to greatly reduce the workload of the treasurer, the board is working on language to amend the by-laws so dues renewal will change to our fiscal year (January to December), and depending when someone new joins there will be a prorate each year (with pennies rounded off). This language will aim to have dues due by each January annual dinner (normally 3rd Saturday in January) and a method to send overdue notices at 30-days (after annual dinner) and membership dropped at 60-days (after annual dinner). If this change is made, we will still make sure you get your whole free 12-months coming to you in 2021—even if it goes into 2022.







Don't forget to Vote (for Walker of the Year!)

I know that we're all tired of hearing about the November 3rd election, but I'm going to talk about our November/ December election for our club officers and Walker of the Year (WoTY). Don't worry – no campaign ads, though!

We moved to a hybrid online/in-person voting system a few years ago, with ballots mailed to our members without an email address. Since we won't have a December meeting, we're asking our club members to vote online when prompted to do so. Online voting begins November 7th and closes November 21st. I'll be using SurveyMonkey again and will use one color for Adult #1 in the household and another color for Adult #2 in the household (if both adults share the same email address).

Those who have not voted online will be mailed a paper ballot on November 23rd to be returned to me no later than December 7th. I will be including a postage paid envelope to be returned to me. That's a cost of \$1.10 per ballot, so voting online will be much cheaper for the club!

Results for the club officer election will be announced immediately to the Board on the evening of December 7th. Results for the 2020 WoTY will be announced at the January Zoom meeting, currently in the planning stages.
