## What you might not know about Gene Leahy Mall

Do any of you remember what the area looked like before the Mall?

Workers spent many days grinding meat and loading boxes in a gritty part of downtown Omaha called Lower Douglas. Business got done, even if the setting wasn't so glamorous. The area that included a butcher shop was also a labyrinth of taverns, flophouses, supply stores and assorted trades.

There was an exodus of businesses away from downtown to the suburbs, most visibly represented by the loss of the downtown Brandeis store.

Many of us older folks remember the beginnings of the Gene Leahy Mall. But do you know where the concept actually came from? The mall began as part of an idea from three University of Nebraska-Lincoln architecture students in 1967. Then Mayor Leahy boosted the student idea by appointing a "Return to the River" Committee, which sketched the first version of the mall. A side note about Gene Leahy–while serving as Mayor he also hosted a Sunday morning TV show where he read the Sunday Funnies to children.

Bell bottomed clerical workers sat behind their typewriters and watched as construction crews leveled a swath of downtown Omaha and then scooped out the sunken park that would become Gene Leahy Mall. Six square blocks of vintage buildings, a rail yard and a lead smelter fell to make way for a sunken park that was viewed as salvation for a then-dying downtown. Soon Omaha boosters had a picture-postcard image of grassy slopes, curving pathways and a lagoon that reflected the skyscrapers behind it. It was dedicated in June, 1977, as Central Park Mall and renamed in Gene Leahy's honor in 1992. The park sparked millions of dollars of new investment around its edges. And those developments, in turn, encouraged construction of still more downtown offices, arts facilities, hotels and apartments.

#### Why change a good thing?

Although it has been in place for years and did help stimulate development, the Return to the River has failed to recently live up to its potential. The lagoon with its trails was designed to provide a restful setting for people taking a break from nearby office buildings. It had minimal use, especially at night due to the perception of safety. It did not provide gathering areas. And there were no ongoing events or safety presence.

#### What is coming?

By raising Gene Leahy Mall, more eyes and activities will be on the park making it safe for all. The RiverFront will have full-time public safety officers 24/7 to ensure the safety and security of guests. It was designed to provide accessible park space for all guests. And activities are planned throughout the days, weekends and evenings.

If you have driven by lately, you have probably noticed the white arches that will cover the Performance Pavilion. The West Lawn will be open for your lawn chairs or blankets while you enjoy musical performances. East of the Performance Pavilion will be the 11<sup>th</sup> Street Promenade. North of the West Lawn will be the Sculpture Garden. These modern sculptures, with names such as Love Exits and Walking Flower Times the Power of Five, will be surrounded by trees and seating areas. You will be able to sit and ponder the art or just relax in the shade. More gardens will be to the west and The Canopies on the southwest. There you will find shaded seating areas to relax, read a book or savor a picnic lunch. If you have noticed the red arches on the south side, you are seeing the Arches Playground. There is a soft surface base to prevent injuries as children play. Not only have the popular slides remained, but they are adding more. And in case you were disappointed when they removed the water elements, worry no more. The Cascades are a fountain for play and The Pond runs along the historic Burlington Building and Greenhouse Apartments. A new addition is the Boat Cove where you can drive your remote controlled boat. The steps remain and are repurposed as the Cove Amphitheater. Bring your dog to the dog park where he can run free. And an important feature that was missing from this park in the past was restrooms. There will be restrooms that will be open, clean and stocked.

So much to look forward to! I hope you will join us on July 4<sup>th</sup> for the grand opening walking tour, either as a walker or as a volunteer.
