The Prez Sez...

Next year will be a year of anniversaries: AVA 50th, U.S. 250th and Rails to Trails Conservancy (RTC)

40th. So I am going to write about the last one. The RTC may be celebrating next year but this year, 2025, The Cowboy Trail in Nebraska (a section of the RTC that generally runs along Hwys 275 and 20) celebrated its 30th anniversary.

So what is a Rail to Trail? Going back 45 years, there was a steady decline of active railway mileage in the U.S. In 1980, Congress deregulated the railroad industry which made it easier for railways to discontinue unprofitable routes. This National Trails System Act was amended three years later into a law with the concept of *railbanking*. The law signed by President Reagan in 1983 allowed railways to voluntarily give up a disused rail corridor to be reworked into an active transportation pathway for human powered travel with the stipulation that it may be converted back to rail use should the need ever arise. Trail usage includes walking, biking (including E-bikes), horseback riding and mountain biking. And boy, did that get hikers pumped!


More than 4,800 miles of railbanked corridor have been repurposed into 273 rail-trails and counting. This includes our very own Cowboy Trail here in Nebraska, which once

completed will become the longest path along the cross-country Great American Rail-Trail. In Nebraska it will connect 30 rural communities and all 4 of the state's distinct ecoregions. Counties include Antelope, Brown, Cherry, Holt, Madison, Rock and Sheridan in which currently 203 of the 317 miles are completed. The endpoints are Rushville in the west and Norfolk in the east.

NE Game and Parks Commission. which maintains the trail, agrees that the slower speed (walk, bike, horse) enables you to really see and experience nature. Trail users will look for fauna and flora in respective regions; burrowing owls and swift foxes in the short grass; pronghorn and sand milkweed in the Sandhills, etc. It's often double-digit mileage from one town to the next; selfsufficiency is part of the deal. The money visitors spend at rural cafes, grocery stores and gas stations can help keep those establishments in business.

Our walks have occasionally used these RTC paths. Sounds like a funbike ride to me!
